

What is the PhD CoLab?

The **PhD CoLab** is a pilot initiative from Graduate & Postdoctoral Studies (G+PS) that will offer awards and guidance to support PhD students and faculty from different disciplines to co-produce new knowledge and/or applications to address complex questions or problems.



Reimagining graduate education



At core of degree (research):

- Expanded ways of thinking, knowing, communicating, doing;
- Expanded partners
- Expanded modes of scholarship (creative, applied, collaborative, knowledge mobilization, etc)

What has UBC done?

- Expanded dissertation format/content
- Tweaked examiner guidelines to convey our support for new dissertation modes
- Promoting non-academic supervisory committee members / mentors (including Indigenous community members)
- Public Scholars Initiative
- Killam Connection course
- CoLab Pilot

Objectives of the pilot

- Provide new opportunities for doctoral students to build competencies and networks in collaborative, inter/transdisciplinary scholarly work
- Advance collaboration as a desired research and learning mode across disciplines to enrich doctoral scholarship
- Enable greater reach and impact of doctoral scholarship and emerging scholars
- Learn through the pilot experience about the interest in collaborative approaches to doctoral research and what is needed to help these kinds of projects to succeed





Awards

Two categories of awards are available:

- "Large" (up to \$100K) three or more students, possibly in multiyear collaborative projects
- "Small" (up to \$30K) two or three students, possibly in shorterterm collaborative projects

Funds can be used to support student stipends, research expenses (broadly defined), dissemination, knowledge mobilization activities

Pilot is for two cycles of funding – 2023/24 and 2024/25, renewals may be possible

Who is eligible to apply?

 Each team must have at least two UBCV faculty members and two UBCV PhD students, drawing from at least two academic disciplines. Others (e.g. postdocs, Master's, undergraduates, external partners) may also be included on the team.

• Faculty members are the primary applicants, but all identified team members will be required to affirm their commitment. Students may also be recruited and/or identified after a successful application is granted.



Process and timeline

Stage 1	Interested teams <u>submit a Letter of Intent (LoI)</u> to G+PS. Due: November 2, 5pm PST
Stage 2	Shortlisting of LoIs. Notifications to be sent out by November 15
Stage 3	Shortlisted teams invited to submit full proposal. Full proposal due: January 22, 2024, 5pm PST
Stage 4	Notification of awards: February 13, 2024
Stage 5	Funds available: April 1, 2024

Letters of Intent – information needed

- Team. The proposed composition of the team, including any non-academic partners
- Scholarship, timeline and impact. A high-level proposal and timeline for collaborative, inter/transdisciplinary scholarship to be undertaken by the team, with a focus on the expected PhD student collaborative work and its potential for positive impacts
- Learning. How PhD student learning and development as collaborative, inter/transdisciplinary scholars will be explicitly supported
- **Outputs.** Potential outputs of the proposed work, especially those co-produced by students, and intended audiences/venues for these outputs
- **Budget.** Whether the interest is in a "small" or "large" award, a draft high-level budget, and a statement regarding how the funds would enable work that is not otherwise funded

And any other relevant information that the adjudication committee should know

Selection criteria

These characteristics will make the strongest applications:

- Focus on PhD student collaborative learning and coleadership (required)
- Clear plan and purpose for inter/transdisciplinary scholarship and collaborative outputs (required)
- The proposed work is intrinsically tied to and substantially advances the students' Doctoral scholarship, and will be reflected in their dissertations (required)
- Collaboration beyond the academy and/or across highly disparate academic disciplines (preferred)
- Scholarship is oriented towards positive impact (preferred)
